



Dear Colleague:

I am pleased to share this month's advocacy updates from the American Society of Nephrology (ASN). Despite the federal government's shutdown, ASN continued to advance kidney health by bolstering kidney research in at least five ways:

- 1. Partnered with Satellite Healthcare to Endow the Norman and Sandra Coplon Research Scholar Grant**

Established with a \$2 million donation from Satellite Healthcare and a matching \$2 million donation from ASN, the [Norman and Sandra Coplon Research Scholar Grant](#) will be awarded annually by [KidneyCure](#) (the ASN Foundation) beginning in 2026. Named for the founder of Satellite Healthcare and his wife, the Transition to Independence Grant honors Norman and Sandra Coplon's commitment to improving the quality of life for people living with kidney diseases. KidneyCure is dedicated to keeping talented investigators in the field of nephrology and on track to making groundbreaking discoveries. The foundation distributes approximately \$3 million annually to clinicians, researchers, fellows, and educators.

- 2. Launched the KidneyCure Bridge Grants Program**

To help sustain researchers affected by federal funding cuts and changes in payment policy by the National Institutes of Health (NIH), [KidneyCure](#) has committed up to \$6 million in additional funding over three years. The [KidneyCure Bridge Grant](#) is a single payment of \$100,000 to bridge NIH applicants to future NIH funding support who:

- Submitted as a contact principal investigator (PI) a kidney-focused proposal to a NIH R01 Research Project Funding Opportunity with deadlines between October 5, 2024, and June 1, 2025.
- Received an overall impact score ranked within the top 15th percentile.
- Were not awarded a grant.

- 3. Partnered on *Americans for Medical Research*, a National Non-Partisan Campaign**

Coordinated with [Research!America](#), [Americans for Medical Research](#) aims to activate key constituencies to contact their Congressional delegation in support of federally funded research.

4. Released *Transforming Kidney Health Research: A Research Agenda for the Future.*

Under ASN's leadership, the [*Transforming Kidney Health Research*](#) initiative brought together the kidney community—including the American Association of Kidney Patients, American Kidney Fund, American Society of Pediatric Nephrology, and National Kidney Foundation—to examine how the nation can reimagine kidney research. The report calls for the federal government to provide **\$1.8 billion annually over the next decade for kidney research** to develop scalable therapies and innovation, and details five interconnected priorities that, together, can transform the nation's approach to kidney health. Reflecting broad collaboration with federal agencies, research institutions, and nonprofit partners, the report provides a unified research agenda to help the United States achieve a bold vision: a future without kidney failure.

5. Supported International Medical Graduates (IMGs)

As the nephrology specialty relies heavily on IMGs, ASN has prioritized immigration advocacy to ensure access to kidney care and quality kidney research across the country. [ASN commented on a proposed rule](#) by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) titled "Weighted Selection Process for Registrants and Petitioners Seeking to File Cap-Subject H-1B Petitions". ASN strongly urged DHS to withdraw the proposed rule implementing a weighted selection process for H-1B visas and to maintain the current process for H-1B visas.

I am also proud to share that following sustained advocacy from ASN—individually and in partnership with the National Kidney Foundation, the Partnership to Advance Cardiovascular Health, and the American Association of Nurse Practitioners—the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) [issued a final National Coverage Determination \(NCD\)](#) on October 28, 2025, to provide Medicare coverage for renal denervation, a minimally invasive procedure to treat uncontrolled hypertension. The decision follows extensive clinical evidence demonstrating durable reductions in blood pressure and represents an important step toward expanding treatment options for patients struggling with high blood pressure.

Finally, I look forward to seeing you next week at ASN Kidney Week 2025 in Houston, TX. Continuing the theme of bolstering research to advance kidney health, I'm absolutely thrilled that the opening plenary session on Thursday, November 6, will—for the first time in history—include the results of two featured clinical trials:


- “Finerenone in CKD and Type 1 Diabetes.”
- “ORIGIN 3: A Phase 3 Trial of Atacicept in IgAN.”
